Day two of this trail through remotest

Knoydart takes you from Barrisdale Bay to Inverie on Loch Nevis, from where ferries run to Mallaig. Inverie is a small village but after two days in the wilderness it feels like a metropolis. Despite being wild and lonely country, the paths are clear throughout, following an ancient route over the pass at Mam Barrisdale and down by Loch an Dubh-Lochain to the coast, and spectacular views out to the Small Isles. The remotest pub in Britain, Inverie's Old Forge, is a good spot for a celebratory tipple to round off an awesome weekend.

1 Start With bothy behind you, turn R on track and cross bridge over river. Keep with track ahead (path to R leads round into Coire Dhorrcail beneath Ladhair Bheinn) and soon pass turn to L which leads to white house. Go past another L turn 300m later (this leads into Gleann Unndalain) and continue ahead on main track up the hill. Keep climbing with path, swinging R and then L around small woodland, until you reach top of pass (1500 feet/450m) where a gorgeous view down Gleann an Dubh-Lochain rewards all your sweat.

2 2 miles/3.1 km The main path begins to descend easily down R-hand

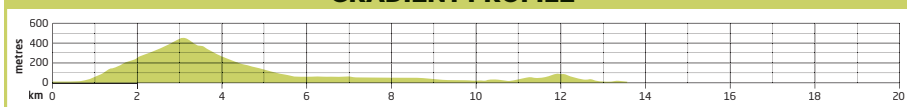

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heading NW across trackless ground and up a steep 'ramp' to the ridge just left of Stob a' Chearcaill. You can then either scramble up and over the narrow ridges of Ladharr Bheinn, or the lower rocky spur of Anach Sgoilte, to descend to Inverie. Both are tough underfoot and to navigate.)

3 3¼ miles/6km

Continue on clear track along northern shore of the

Loch an Dubh-Lochain, and on beside meanders of Inverie River. Ignore track turn to L and keep going until you're alongside a small hill to your R – Torr a' Bhalbain. A short detour takes you to the monument at its summit, built by the unpopular landowner, the 2nd Lord Brocket, in honour of his parents.

4 6½ miles/10.3 km

Keep heading west along

the main track, ignoring the turn to the L and passing through a small conifer plantation. You'll now have a wall to your L, and soon a woodland. Continue past the gate into woods on your L, and curve gently L with the main track which becomes a lane. Ignore all turnings and follow the lane round to R and along Inverie's shore, past shop, café and pub, to reach pier and ferry. **CW**
